

- Light Rail Stage 2A will extend the light rail system from Alinga Street to Commonwealth Park. The 1.7km extension will follow along London Circuit West. It will feature stops at Edinburgh Avenue and City South. It will feature new stops at Edinburgh Avenue, City South, and Commonwealth Park.

The City as a Score: Conducting the future of Canberra

The great cities of the world have their own soundtracks, their own rhythms and pulse.

New York is syncopation, a city built on improvisation. Paris is an accordion in Montmartre. Rio is the sway of the samba, and Berlin a techno beat. What of Canberra? What is our sound?

With the <u>ACT Government introducing new policies to strengthen Canberra's nighttime economy.</u> including the establishment of the City Centre Entertainment Precinct, our city is at a turning point. Now is the time to think beyond individual venues and ask how music can be embedded into our urban fabric as an essential part of city-making.

All cities are music cities. But not all cities design, maintain and invest in their musical identity as a type of infrastructure. Yet, if Canberra is a driver of economic growth, social cohesion and cultural identity, how can Canberra build on its new reforms to maximise the benefits for our city's future?

What would happen if we treated Canberra's music like a type of infrastructure? How would that change the way we design and develop our city?

In this session, Catherine Carter will examine how every street, square, bridge and building in Canberra is part of a larger score – and how we can tune Canberra's urban renewal for sound. This session will explore:

- How can the ACT's recent reforms be a springboard for positioning Canberra as a leading global 'music city'?
- What is the economic case for treating music as infrastructure beyond entertainment precincts?
- What are the key indicators for a musical city across governance, economics, social and cultural wellbeing?
- What can we learn from global music cities? What do they do well? What can we do better?
- How can the built environment better support our grassroots music scene and broader cultural economy?
- What practical changes can we make today to better 'compose' our city's future sound?

A City Shaping Tower and Precinct: Salesforce Tower Sydney





Sydney's 263m tall Salesforce Tower, designed by Foster + Partners in association with Architecus, is a catalytic development that has enabled revitalisation of a large precinct in Sydney CBD's adjacent to Circular Quay and Sydney harbour. Development of the tower has delivered new pedestrian retail laneways, a rebuilt Jackson on George bar and restaurant, public bike hub, incubation spaces, a new community building that includes Australia's largest indigenous urban artwork by Daniel Boyd and the newly created George Street Plaza. The presentation will outline the project and its attributes, and explore the process, challenges and lessons learned designing and delivering this iconic and city shaping project.

Join Dario, Principal, Architectus, a Canberra born and educated architect and Muir Livingstone, Partner, Foster + Partners, who are both frequent visitors to Canberra and have an ongoing personal connection to the city. Muir was one of the lead designers from Foster + Partners responsible for the tower's design. Dario worked closely with Muir from the design competition stage back in 2016 through to final delivery in 2022. He was also the Principal in Charge/lead architect for the local executive architectural team from Architectus responsible for delivery of the project.


